BBC WINTERWATCH LIVE LESSON

On Thursday 31st January, the Science Ambassadors watched the BBC Winterwatch Live Lesson to find out more about: adaptation, eco-systems, the environment.





Before the lesson, children found out about the wildlife in their local area. They discovered different habitats such as ponds, forests and fields and what was living there. One child also found out that there was a female falcon living locally. She could tell it was a female because it was not brightly coloured.

The children all really enjoyed the BBC Live Lesson. Here are some facts that they have learnt:

- Some animals such as foxes, dogs and cats, can grow extra fur to keep them warm.
- Everything in nature is part of an Eco-system and if one thing changes it could affect everything.
- The Wood Frog freezes itself so that it can hibernate. In spring, it starts to thaw, and all of its organs begin working again.
- If you see a hedgehog in November to March, and it is smaller than a grapefruit it has been woken up from its hibernation and does not have much energy it needs looking after.
