Parent Consultations

We hope you found consultations useful and informative this week. It was interesting to see the number of parents who chose to bring the children's termly report from Christmas with them. We do hope you are finding the more regular reporting useful. Thank you for helping us to keep to time by arriving promptly and limiting discussions to the appointment time allowed.

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Apologies for the cancellation of Miss Murfin's appointments at short notice. We hope this did not cause inconvenience. Miss Murfin will be offering an open classroom on Thursday 5th March from 3:30 – 4:30 for all parents who wish to spend time looking through their child's work. This would be a suitable time if you wanted a quick chat with Miss Murfin where she would be available to give a brief update. If you wanted to make a more formal appointment, or cannot make this time, or you have a specific issue that you would like to discuss in a more confidential environment, then please drop her a note and she will be happy to arrange that.

With regard to the reports, we are aware that the headings chosen for the descriptions have caused some discussion. We firmly believe in having high expectations of all children and have evidence over time that these high expectations improve children's outcomes.

When we designed the reports we made a deliberate choice to have 4 headings:

Exceptional, Consistent, Most of the time and Requires support or prompting.

This was a conscious change from the headings parents will be familiar with from our annual reports:

Outstanding, Good, Satisfactory, Varies and Needs to improve.

We made the change because we wanted to be really clear with parents about their child's performance. In the old report we inadvertently created a redundant category – by having varies and needs to improve. We effectively had two categories which were similar and interchangeable. It is our understanding from conversations with parents that they found the 'satisfactory' grading more acceptable when it fell in the middle of the spectrum (3rd of 5), however less parents are comfortable when their child falls in the 3rd of 4 categories.

The introduction of the exceptional category seems to have also caused consternation for some parents. By the very nature of the word exceptional, we are identifying those children that stand out above the norm of the class. It is only possible for a very small number of children to be exceptional.

What we would ask parents to do is read the whole sentence with the judgement included e.g.

Your child: Respects and responds well to adults, most of the time.

Your child: is exceptionally organised and independent

We hope this will give a slightly clearer understanding and help parents to understand our rationale. Changes in reporting to parents have been discussed at each stage in great detail with Parent Forum. If you would like to get involved in these type of discussions, please share your thoughts with a Parent Forum representative, or even consider standing yourself next year.

What I am pleased to share from a school perspective is that we have noticed a number of improvements in children's approach / attitude / engagement as a direct result of the Christmas reports and this can only be a positive step forward for our children and their success.
