Summer 2 provision

Thank you to all parents who returned their completed questionnaire this week. We have 249 children in school and we received 207 responses, which is fabulous.

Through the information gathered, we have identified 25% of these are either Key Workers or Vulnerable children. We will continue to offer provision for these children throughout Summer Term - from the bookings already made, we will be running two or three classes each day in school, these numbers will increase as we know that a number of Key workers will receive notification of work patterns after 1st June.

The survey also told us that 32% of parents would not be looking for children to return to school until September and 33% of Y6 would like to return just for transition activities (whether these be virtual or physical)

43 parents wanted children to return full time, 19 part time and a further 14 would be happy with either / whatever school felt best. A small number (5%) gave a date for desired return or indicated ASAP, most said whenever it is safe (or words to that effect) and a few suggested occasional days in July to support for transition to the next year group.

The survey also asked about requirements for Early Birds and Night Owls. We can confirm that based on uptake we will be running Early Birds, but not Night Owls.

In response to the questions around Zoom tutor groups, a large percentage (over 80%) had some experience of using the software; more than 40% used it regularly. There was an overwhelmingly positive response to the introduction of virtual lessons / tutor groups. We will communicate with parents of individual year groups about this from Monday 1st June.

Governors have reviewed the data from all areas of the survey. Our decision not to open to Y6 from 1st June still stands. As clearly indicated we will continue to review this on a weekly basis and will keep parents updated on our decisions going forward.

Below are the results from this week's battles.



A good effort for Y3 with 33 players taking part this morning. They were highest scoring year group and this battle was probably the closest we have seen yet with 3EH taking victory by just 107 points! This year group also saw the 2 highest scoring players of the morning.

In Y4, 30 children played with 4P taking victory by just over 2000 points. Year 5 saw the highest turnout with 38 players. 5M took a huge victory with 15,041 points almost 7,000 more than 5K and also making them the highest

scoring class overall. A much lower turnout for Y6 with just 10 players, however they battled strongly with 6P taking victory by almost 2,000 points.
