School Books, Sports Kit and Musical Instrument return

Just before school closed, we gave all children the between 3 and 5 books from our Reading Scheme, Library and class reader sets such as Kensuke's Kingdom & War Horse. We would like to ask for your help in returning these books to school in the next week. Ideally, if we could have them back before we break up for summer, it would give us chance to clean and restock all of our reading materials ready for September.

Please bring school books to the entrance hall where there are some boxes in which they can be placed. Although we are normally happy to receive Barton Library books and return them on your behalf, it would be helpful if you could not send these to us now, but take them back to Barton Library when it is open.

Secondly, we will be having a Sports Kit amnesty asking parents to return any items of school competition kit that they may have found themselves with during Lockdown.

Finally, we would like to ask all children in Y5 who were learning clarinet, any in other years who were learning any instrument to return it to school (UNLESS they wish to continue lessons next year, in which case it is yours for free over the Summer)

Please could we ask you to check all of the parts are inside the box before returning, but to also remove any reeds / tissues / any items which do not belong in the case.

In order for us to keep a track of these very expensive instruments, it will be necessary for you to collect a named receipt as proof of return from an adult in the office.

All of these items can be returned between 8am and 4pm any day next week.

Cheeky request for donations too ... if you find yourself with a spare / unwanted Billionaire Boy or Mr Stink by David Walliams, we'd love to set up a class reader set of these ready for next year, so any donations would be gratefully received .

September return

We are delighted to have finalised our initial plans for a full return in September. Children should by now have taken part in their 'Meet the Teacher' Zoom sessions, we have also held our transitions discussions between staff and will be moving to new classrooms in a phased system over two days next week.

In order to facilitate the recommentations, we will be making a number of small changes and some more signifiant ones in school and also to the structure of the school day. We will talk through these changes with the children, but wanted to give parents information to reassure them about the measures we have in place.

We will be working in **year group** bubbles; however, we will endeavour as much as possible to keep the children in class groups, when we split into our smaller groups, we will keep children from the two classes separate.

We will be asking parents for their agreement to keep children off school if they or any member of the household displays symptoms, however mild. In addition, asking you to inform us if any member of the family is asked to isolate as part of the NHS Test and Trace.

We will be operating a slightly staggered start and finish time. The Upper School day will be from 8:40 - 3:20 and Lower School from 8:50 - 3:30. Children will not be able to access the playground from 8:30 as they previously have done - if you need child care before school starts, please book Early Birds. We have tried to keep the stagger as small as possible, but still give us the best opportunity to get children in to school safely and quickly. If any start time clashes with Infant Bubble start times, then please bring your child to us as soon as you can after the Infants.

Y5 & 6 children should arrive between 8:40 and 8:50; Y3 & 4 should arrive between 8:50 and 9:00.

Please do not congregate at the gate before your start time. We will keep the register open in class for a reasonable period to help those families with multiple drop offs to make.

We will be offering a hot dinner option from Day 1 when we return and will be implementing a rolling lunch rota which takes place within a lesson time, so one class every 10 minutes will leave their classroom wash hands, go to the hall, they will have 30 minutes to eat their dinner or sandwiches, then return to class again to wash hands and continue their lesson. Tables will then be sterilised before the next class arrives. Morning and afternoon breaks will be in class groups and have been extended to 30 minutes each to accommodate for the lack of playime at lunch. We feel this is the safest and cleanest way to operate a lunchtime whilst also being able to offer hot food, which still gives children good opportunities to play outside, gettting fresh air and a run around.

Seating in class is likely to be in lines facing the front of class initially, and to begin with we are asking children NOT to bring anything with them to school with the exception of a waterproof coat and sandwich box if required. All stationery will be provided and we will let you know in Spetember about the requirement for any sports kit and our provision for homework.



The Summer Reading Challenge is still going ahead this year so why not join the Silly Squad and use the summer break to enjoy a celebration of funny books, happiness and laughter?

Because of Coronavirus restrictions, this year's campaign has now launched earlier than usual and children are being encouraged to read books they have at home, or e-books until libraries are able to reopen safely.
