Mrs Sharpe's Assemblies


Information for next week's assemblies is attached - the theme is 'Healthy Mind, Healthy Body'. The following week (1^{st} - 3^{rd} February), the assembly theme is 'Art Attack'. Hopefully we'll learn some new techniques and create some mini masterpieces. I wanted to give parents time to order some art supplies if they would like (they are not essential and can be substituted with poster paints and the side of a cereal box if desired).

The suggested shopping list: Three canvases (or thick white card), acrylic paints, masking tape, selection of brushes. All of these are available on Amazon (other suppliers are available) or to make things a bit easier, we would like to offer parents the option to buy the whole kit including paints and 3 canvases from school at cost (£14.05 for one child); 2 siblings (double brushes and 6 canvases) £18.19; 3 siblings - 3 sets of brushes and 9 canvases - £22.33. If you would like a kit, please make payment via ParentPay by Monday 25^{th} January so materials can be organised and prepared for collection from school by Friday 29^{th} January. Children in school (1^{st} - 3^{rd} February) who wish to take part will need either to purchase a kit or bring three cereal box sides to school.

Kindle app

Did you also know that you can download the Kindle app on to your iPad / iPhone? There are quite a number of free books, or if you have Amazon Prime, this gives you <u>free</u> access to Prime Reading.

Once you've chosen your books, you can then edit your settings (instructions via link below) and read any book with background colours of white, black or sepia, as well as changing font colour, size and style (there is a dyslexia friendly style).

Kindle also offers a feature which allows children to read a page top to bottom and turn over, or an option for continual scan. Additionally, on continual scan and they can load a coloured reading ruler.



Other reading options now Libraries are closed:

If the children have a library card, they can use the BorrowBox app. This is a free app that allows them to download both e-books and audio books.



There was a healthy turnout for our latest boys vs girls battle. 153 children took part and together answered more than 230,000 questions correctly! It was a battle dominated by the boys throughout the week and, when the battle finished at 2pm on the 15th January, the final score was 152,389 to the boys and 81,341 to the girls.
