IN THE BRANCHES!


Through the week, Years 4, 5 and 6 got the opportunity to try something new by climbing one of the oak trees at school – and for many pupils, it was definitely a major highlight!

PACKINGTON **TEAM-BUILDING**

On Tuesday 6th and Wednesday 7th July, Year 6 headed off to Packington Farm for a team building day.

All of these activities allowed Year 6 to show excellent planning, teamwork, co-operation and communication skills and they scored themselves out of 20 for each task completed. These points were then turned into currency for the afternoon task: shelter building.

Each team were able to use their points to 'buy' shelter building equipment to build a water-tight shelter. Each shelter was unique and again allowed the children to show the skills they had practised in the morning. Each group created a fantastic shelter; however, when they were tested for their waterproof capabilities, a lot of the groups got a little wet!

We were all challenged throughout the day (particularly by the Magic Helium Sticks) and had a fantastic time.
